Christmas has been loved, ignored and even *illegal* at different times in the world's history.



Nobody actually knows when Jesus was born.

In the 4th century, Christians chose the date. It would be during the darkest time of year. It would be the date Romans celebrated the birth of their sun god. December 25 would make a good date to celebrate the birth of our *Christian* God, the One of whom it was written "in him was life, and the life was the light of all people." John 1:4

Christmas was a minor festival in the church year for its first thousand+ years. *Easter* is the primary Christian festival and the reason for ALL church seasons! :) Pentecost is probably the second oldest holy day. Then, in the 4th century came the celebration of Christ's birth on 12/25, and soon after Epiphany on 1/6 (when the foreign magi search for the babe). In the 6th century, Christmas was extended to Epiphany and became the 12-day season that we know.

By the 16th century Reformation, Christmas had become a prominent celebration. However, it was handed down through the years with many regional pagan and folk traditions mixed in with it – from yule logs to evergreens to elves or spirits. In the 17th century a zealous Protestant group, the English Puritans, condemned the celebration of Christmas, considering it a Roman Catholic invention with the "trappings of popery." In the new world, the Pilgrims *outlawed* Christmas celebrations in Boston in 1659. The ban was revoked by 1681 but it took 200 years for Christmas to became popular in the Boston region. Further south, Christian residents of New York and Virginia observed Christmas freely because among the settlers were German Moravians. Then again, after the American Revolution, Christmas fell out of favor in the United States as it was considered "too English."

Currently, everyone seems to love the season of Christmas! It's been embraced by non-religious people who have redefined it for themselves and made their own non-religious traditions. Even the preparation season of Advent has become so popular that you can find Advent calendars filled with anything from beauty items to artisanal olive oils!

Some have said that Christians should try to reclaim Christmas or strive to "Keep Christ in Christmas." However, didn't we begin by borrowing the date and sharing it with the Roman Empire?!

In the end, Christmas isn't really ours to control. It's God's gift to believers. It's that celebration that once again Jesus is born in you and me. See, what we celebrate at Christmas is not merely Jesus' birthday – but *our* birthday in Christ; that is, that Christ is born in us and gives us new life - no matter what's going on in the world.

God bring new life to you this Advent and Christmas!



Please remember in your prayers all of our parish family and friends who suffer physically, emotionally, and are battling life altering conditions. Lord Jesus, who went about doing good and healing all, we ask you to bless our friends who are sick. Give them strength in body, courage in spirit, and patience in pain. Let them recover their health, so that restored, they may joyfully praise your name, for you and reign for ever and ever. Amen.


with thanksgiving and praise as we receive your numerous gifts.

Operating Notes: (Un)Favorable Year-to-Date variances: 2024 versus 2023

- A. Includes a one-time generous offering in November
- B. Pastor and employees were given 5% increases
- C. Favorable variances for Utilities \$2,423, Repairs \$839 and Cleaning service \$1,288; offest in part by higher snow removal (\$1,651) and increased Insurance rates (\$1,776)
- D. Worship & Music (\$585) incurred costs that are normally cyclical over 2 or 3 years, all hitting in 2024.

Treasurer's Observations on Operating P&L:

A significant one-time offering received in November along with our careful spending has helped to make the year-to-date November 2024 operating "income" a positive. But we need to continue our pattern of financial diligence in order to keep our bottom line positive and/or at breakeven (our target), especially into 2025.

Giving to Zion can be done through traditional Sunday offerings, mailed checks, Vanco, and now also Venmo.

If you are 70.5 or older, have an IRA and do not itemize on your tax return, please inquire about making pre-tax offerings to Zion (QCD) -- it will save you taxes!

Non-Operating Notes:

- D. The Ort Farm event in 2024 accounts for most of the revenues and payments for Ministries;
- E. Principal balance of the Mortgage on 11/30/24 is \$137,635.73; it is funded \$45,032 for the next 11+ months thanks in part to a significant and generous donation made in November.
- F. Mortgage payments for YTD October total \$42,900, consisting of \$34,960 principal plus \$7,940 interest.
- G. The Non-Operating balance is \$277,014: \$57,453 is in checking with the remainder conservatively invested.
- H. The Livestreaming equipment loan with the NJ Synod is now fully forgiven (i.e. the balance is zero).

An update from Council on Stewardship's 'Estimate of Giving' efforts.

The good news is that the estimates of giving show an increase in giving of over 10%!

However, we face a unique situation this year: A very generous household has moved away, and we need to make up that gap in giving in order to support all of the current ministries that we do. Right now, the gap looks to be almost \$18,000, even with the increases in giving. So we are appealing to those who have provided Estimates, those who have not provided Estimates, and those who give through Simply Giving; basically, the entire congregation, so that we all share responsibility to do what we can (if we are able) to close the estimated \$18,000 budget shortfall.

This will allow us to support our current staff, utilities, and all of the ministries that we do as a congregation (which the staff & buildings help make possible).

Year End Property Report 2024

Completed Work at Zion:

- 1. Annual fire inspection of the doors and safety exit signs, and batteries are completed in Faith Hall and the church and education wings
- 2. Lighting in Faith Hall: ceiling lights where needed are upgraded to LED's. We will continue to R&R them and upgrade them in the future. The majority of them have been replaced and upgraded creating better lighting and are more energy efficient LED's.
- 3. New exit signs in the Sanctuary
- 4. Thanks to Thrivent for monies from their Grant Program to help offset the cost of multiple projects throughout the church. Anyone who is a Thrivent member may apply for grants for Zion projects and is encouraged to do so. If you are not a member, you may apply for \$20 per year and will then become a member for that year. Please see Sarah if you need assistance to do so, and it's always for a great cause for those of us that serve others. Thank you for that.
- 5. Grounds cleanup for Spring and Fall was completed. Thanks to Brian Bumpus and the Cub Scouts for helping organize this event and to those from Zion who showed up to help.
- 6. Flowers were planted in the whiskey barrels and the swale are is being revamped for better maintenance and aesthetics.
- 7. Pot holes in exit driveway are repaired.
- 8. Remember that the Bat houses are installed on campus as part of an Eagle Scout project. This is also part of a conservation effort to save and preserve bats in NJ. If you are there at dusk, you may see them coming and going from them.
- 9. Electric receptacles have been installed to replace the one extension cord that supplies power to the entire AV system and computers when services are ongoing.
- 10. New lock for the dumpster is in place to prevent, we hope, people from coming into our property to dump their garbage and construction materials. Schools have the same problem in town, and surveillance is the key for now, as well as prevention measures.
- 11. Weed and Feed has been installed. Hopefully our grass will start looking a bit healthier as we move along this year. In the Spring we will be adding reseeding and fertilizer to the menu for the church.
- 12. New railings have been added to the church front porch office building. Thank you, George and others who helped, make this happen.
- 13. Front porch to the office building has also been painted.
- 14. Fire and smoke alarm system has been installed in the basement of the office building. New NJ regulations for evacuation procedures require this install.
- 15. Painting the office facia over the porch has been done. Our insurance company is now a little bit happier, I think. Thank you to the Scudese family!
- 16. Extensive work has been done to the Parsonage which included new windowpanes in many rooms, washing and cleaning the entire building, painting both inside and out, as well as general cleanup of the property. We will have new church members. Thank you all: Ron, George, Sarah, Ingrid, Judy and Brian and Marcia.
- 17. Fire inspection of the Parsonage went well.
- 18. Boilers in all the buildings have been serviced and inspected. We continue to benefit from the triple high efficiency boilers in the church and sanctuary.

Property continued

New/Future Business:

- 1. Everyone is asked to be vigilant about turning off lights throughout the properties when they are not in use. Among other things, this saves energy as well as the church unnecessary expense.
- 2. Speakers in Faith Hall that are part of the PA system are burned out. Members of the Congregation are comparing notes on what we need to do for the future.
- 3. Lead inspection is in progress.
- 4. Caulking of thresholds in Faith Hall driveway side will be completed when the weather permits.
- 5. Patching the chipped paint in the Sanctuary is on the agenda.






