LENT AT ZION THIS SPRING



“Lent” is mostly known in our culture as a time to give up something good; however, it’s really far more meaningful and life-giving than that! Originally, it was a time for adults to prepare for Baptism at the Easter (Eve) Vigil service. When adult baptism became rarer in the church, it still offered Christians the occasion to re-orient themselves in their baptismal identity. At heart, Lent is about seeing that we need forgiveness *and* that God forgives us. For Lutherans in particular, Lent isn’t a season of sacrifice, but rather, a *gift of time* by which God re-orient us: from self-centered, insecure people into forgiven, other-centered people.

Kneelers returning

After a few discussions, the Worship & Music team decided to return the altar rail kneelers, giving the opportunity to kneel for Communion for those who desire it. However, if you have bad or painful knees, my recommendation would be to remain standing – acting as a good steward of the body that God’s placed in your care! We shall revisit our decision in a few months.

Shrove Tuesday, 3/4 6pm – for adults & children

Shrove Tuesday is a celebration before the somber season of Lent begins the next day. On Tuesday night we eat pancakes & donuts for dinner and then burn last year’s palms from Palm Sunday to make ashes for the next day’s worship service.

Ash Wednesday, 3/5 7:30pm

As always, ashes are optional.

We begin Lent being mindful of our mortality and returning to God’s mercy and grace. It’s a good time to be reminded that the span of life is a gift, and see the big picture.

Wednesday Evenings in Lent (3/12, 3/19, 3/26, 4/2, 4/9)

Lenten Soup Supper 6-7pm

There is a tradition of eating simply in Lent. We gather together to eat soup and have fellowship.

Candlelight Evening Prayer, 7 – 7:30pm

We use the candlelight sung prayer (vesper) service from Marty Haugen which we look to the light of Christ to scatter the darkness, even as we anticipate the final resurrection when all of creation will be made new. The theme is *Christians United in the Faith: 1700 Years of the Creed of Nicaea* (for details see page 6.)

What is Lent?

Lent is mostly known in our culture as a time to give up something good; however, it's really far more meaningful and life-giving than that! Wednesday Evenings in Lent: Soup & Vespers



6PM Soup Supper

Join together with a small group of Christian friends in Lent, for a simple dinner and fellowship.

7PM Lenten Vespers

We'll gather in the sanctuary for a 30-minute evening worship service - an ancient liturgy that begins in the dark with candles and proclaims Jesus to be the light of the world.

Theme: See below for theme of the year.

Come to one or both.

Christians United in the Faith: 1700 Years of the Creed of Nicaea

"Change and decay in all around I see." So wrote the poet of the famous hymn, "Abide with Me." Indeed, most things change; some things even have "planned obsolescence" built into them! Even in a congregation as old as ours, things change. Who would want forty-five-minute sermons or worship in German of our first pastor, Henry Melchior Muhlenberg. One thing in our worship and faith is celebrating its 1700th anniversary this year: The Nicene Creed. This Creed unites Christians around the world: Lutheran, Methodist, Episcopalian, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Greek and Russia Orthodox—to name just a few denominations confessing this creed. Nothing proves the truth of Christ's prayer in John 17 ("That they [my disciples] may be one") better than the continued use of this remarkable statement of faith in Christ.

In the year A. D. 325, between 20 May and 25 July, bishops from around the Roman Empire, met at Emperor Constantine's behest in the town of Nicaea (now Iznik, Turkey) to address a crisis in the church. Certain people claimed that Jesus Christ, whom the gospel of John confessed as God ("The Word was God"), was not God at all but only a lesser crea-

tion. “There was [a time] when he was not,” they insisted. The bishops in Nicaea responded by reworking the baptismal creed of Jerusalem (similar to our Apostles’ Creed) and confessed that the “only Son” was “true God from true God” and “of one being with the Father.” Later other bishops, this time meeting in 381 in the capital of the Roman Empire Constantinople in 381, reworked the Creed of Nicaea into our Nicene Creed insisting that the Holy Spirit is truly God.

To celebrate this amazing Christian unity, sermons during Wednesday Vespers during Lent will focus on that Creed, as a sign of Christian unity and a living confession of Christian faith in the Triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Come and confess our faith together!

Wednesdays in Lent, Sermon Titles & Descriptions

March 12: “We believe ... in God the Maker.” Setting aside the question of “how” God made the earth, the Creed confesses “Who” made the whole universe.

March 19: “We believe in One Lord Jesus Christ ... True God.” Why does it matter to confess Jesus as truly God? It means, as the English theologian, J. B. Philipps once put it, “We live on a visited planet.” Jesus Christ is truly Immanuel, “God with us.”

March 26: “We believe in One Lord Jesus Christ ... who for us and for our salvation came down.” This part of the Creed touches upon the very heart of the Christian faith: God became a child of Mary so that we may become children of God. Our faith rests not on what we do for God but what God in Christ has done, is doing, and will do for us.

April 2: “We believe in the Holy Spirit.” We confess the Trinity as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, but, as Martin Luther noticed, we experience the Trinity backwards: “The Holy Spirit leads us to Christ who is the mirror of the Father’s heart.”

April 9: “We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church.” In a world where it’s “Every man for himself, and winner takes all,” the Creed insists that Christians cannot and dare not try to go it alone. United in Christ to God the Father by the Holy Spirit, we are together swept up beyond ourselves into the life of the Triune God.

Treasurer's Observations:

Zion's year-to-date Operating Loss (\$3,446) in 2025 is better than last year's (\$9,859), but nevertheless still represents a deficit spending mode. A couple of unexpected electrical and heating system repairs, along with higher snowplowing and heat bills were the principal causes for the Y-T-D shortfall in 2025. It is hoped that future repairs can be avoided and there'll be no more snow. Please continue to give generously and in a timely manner to avoid financial issues down the road for Zion.

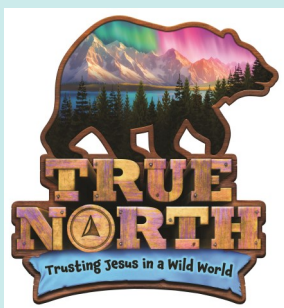
